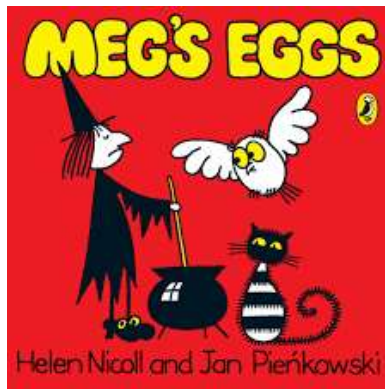

What is going to hatch from Meg's Eggs? This bright and enchanting story has lots of speech bubbles, rhymes and sound words which you can talk about. They all help to bring the story to life.

Rhyme Being able to hear which words rhyme is a very helpful pre-reading skill. In fact, children that are good at recognising rhymes and can make up their own rhymes progress well when they begin to read. There are lots of examples in the book such as egg/legs and lumps/bumps.

Magic Potions In the story Meg adds lots of interesting things into her cauldron. See what things you can find to add to your own potion. You might be able to use things that you find outside such as leaves, petals and mud!

Counting There are lots of opportunities for counting in the book. How many newts and frogs are in the magic potion? You could count how many ingredients there are in total. It is really important that children understand that the last number which they count is the total number. There is also the opportunity to look at numerals including large numbers such as 98 and 100. Children are often fascinated by large numbers.
